Bandon resident Roger Straus spoke on behalf of the Southern Coos Health Foundation, which has worked to bring a school nurse into Ocean Crest. It is their hope and plan to bring school nurses in at the other two schools as well. He also spoke on behalf of the Lion's Club, encouraging the schools to approach their club for assistance whenever necessary.

The board received three emails from community members concerning the recent closure of outdoor district facilities during school hours.

# Student Learning: BSD Plan for Achievement

We acknowledge the state report card and see the work that needs to be done. As a new administrative team, and coming off of COVID, we knew this was coming. With new eyes on data, we have a plan in place for each building to help drive instruction and meet each child where they are.

#### District Level-

New math curriculum coming,full time Nurse District wide, full time mental health therapists in each building, NWEA for progress monitoring K-12, Behavior Interventionist for middle school and high school.

# Bandon High School-

Our focal points this year will be Math redesign/ materials adoption and Discovery Training. We feel these changes will help us meet students where they are, improve attendance and help kids meet math graduation requirements.

Our math numbers are historically low. Even before the COVID pandemic and the disruption to learning it caused, students have struggled meeting the Math standards. We have the traditional Math "path" of Alg I, Geometry, and Alg II. Until recently, the state did not allow much deviation for students trying to earn a Standard diploma. Recently, for the new Math adoption, they are allowing multiple paths based upon the trajectory of the students. Courses being developed now, by regional STEM Hubs across the state, include Data Science, Quantitative Reasoning and Financial Algebra. They call the model 2+1. Students have options and we are working this year to research, vet and adopt new materials, which are in alignment with the new model. This flexibility will help us support students in Math. The new books and model will be in classrooms next Fall, district-wide.

We can't teach students well if they are chronically absent. Many kids spent a couple years in their rooms, not interacting with others. Dropping back into a full school with 200 other kids has been tough on many of them. However, we know if they feel supported, safe and cared for as people, they are more likely to come to school. The

Discovery Program helps students in the classroom and, hopefully when they graduate, be productive citizens in the world of work or post-secondary education. For example, topics include problem-solving, effective communication and emotional regulation. Knowing our expectations and holding kids accountable with dignity and respect are the cornerstones of this program. We need to meet kids where they are emotionally, so we can teach them academics. Most BHS staff have attended a four-day training by the experts in Discovery this summer. We will focus on the underclassmen this year.

# Harbor Lights Middle School-

Harbor Lights has prioritized meeting student needs in multiple ways this year including making schedule shifts to allow for smaller class sizes and expanding our elective offerings at the 7th and 8th grades. Our state assessment data shows a significant need for support in math, so we have split the cohorts into three sections per grade level in comparison with the historical offering of two sections. Our new math teacher comes with middle school math experience including differentiating instruction to help fill instructional gaps. This will be increasingly beneficial as we work to build foundational skills and recoup missed instruction from interrupted schooling during the COVID pandemic.

We are offering daily PE to our 5th and 6th grade students, allowing us to expand our 7th and 8th grade elective offerings by incorporating our 5th and 6th grade teachers into the staffing mix. This year students will have choice-based electives rather than a "wheel of options" that results in every student being exposed to every elective. We are offering Creative Writing/Art, Gardening, Yearbook, STEM Chemistry, STEM Energy, Introductory and Advanced Robotics, Leadership, Keyboarding, and Wood Shop, Music/Choir, and Band. Some of our more popular options will have multiple sections each semester to accommodate student interest, with the greatest example of this being our Family and Computer Science (FACS) and Wood Shop offerings with 2 sections each semester. These electives were decided upon with input from students and teachers to ensure that we were giving students something they would be excited about and using the talents and interests of our teachers to the fullest.

## Ocean Crest Elementary School-

We plan to provide extra adult support for every math group, core reading group, as well as targeted support for reading intervention. This means every teacher will have an educational assistant in their class during their core math and reading to help support in small/targeted groups. Our data teams (this includes the grade level teachers, special education teacher, Title I teacher, and principal) meet every 6 weeks for each grade level to discuss the data and help drive instruction and needed interventions.

We also have Student Study Team meetings where we focus on a certain student at a time that might be struggling academically or behaviorally. We put interventions in place to meet the need and then reevaluate as a team 4-6 weeks later to discuss next steps.

Opening for the staff was amazing! Opening for students is always the best part of the new school year!
