
Building: Finally starting to move forward on the bus barn and the CTE building projects. The cost has increased significantly since last Fall.

Special Education Update:

• The current focus of our statewide accountability measures is students on an abbreviated day schedule and we currently have zero students in that category. In the event that a student with special education eligibility has an abbreviated day decision within the IEP team process, we will need to report to the state if that abbreviated day plan is in place for more than 30 days. We have been assigned to Cohort B (2023–24) for our cyclical monitoring, so we will not have a comprehensive review this year. I believe part of that placement was due to our participation in the pilot program last spring!

- BHS Culinary students have been doing an amazing job this year. We are thrilled to have SpEd EA Sasha Knudson help lead this class to inspire the kids.
